This issue of *Leaven* will give you a good idea of what we've been about since our last issue. The chronicles and photos throughout this issue will fill in my few remarks.



Nifty Fifty Festival and Flea Market Celebrating Madonna Manor's 50th Anniversary June 14, 2014

The cover of this issue of LEAVEN features pictures from June 14, the day of the Nifty Fifty Festival and Flea Market celebrating Madonna Manor's 50th anniversary. Early in the year **Nancy Phillips**, the Director of Marketing for Madonna Manor, approached **Sr. Mary Catherine** asking what she would like to do to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Madonna Manor's ministry. Remembering Madonna Manor's yearly flea market raising funds for its benevolent care fund, Sr. Mary Catherine suggested a flea market. It would provide an occasion for cleaning out monastery rooms, closets, storage areas of unneeded items and a way to interest people in the work of the monastery, Madonna Manor, Villa Madonna Academy and Villa Madonna Montessori. It also gave the four organizations at 2344 and 2500 Amsterdam Rd. an opportunity to work together and raise funds for their individual needs.

The overall steering committee consisted of Sr. Deborah Harmel-

ing, St. Walburg Monastery; Janet Baugh, Villa Madonna Academy and Nancy Phillips, Madonna Manor. This group named and planned the day, decided where each flea market would take place and how to share



costs, expertise and publicity. Villa Madonna Academy and Villa Madonna Montessori held their flea markets in the Academy gym while St. Walburg Monastery and Madonna Manor shared a tent (*see above*) on Madonna Manor property.

June 14 was preceded by about four months of gathering items, pricing and storing them. **Sr. Cathy Bauer** set up flea market rooms on floors 1-3 in the monastery and moved items around so that **Sr. Mary Tewes** and **Peggy Kinsella**, an experienced volunteer from the Diocesan Catholic Children's Home flea market, could put prices on items. **Sr. Mariana Kirk** (*see cover top, middle*) priced religious items and organized enough rosaries, statues and medals to stock a religious goods store. **Maureen Smain** and **Sr. Joan Fraenzle** (*see cover, middle left*) spent weeks making bake sale items. Maureen held evening volunteer baking events for friends, previous Manor and Monastery employees and sisters making dozens of cookies and other items. **Gene Weber** and **Lois Moore** (*see cover bottom, right*), previous Madonna Manor flea market volunteers and **Marge Kruse**, who ran Madonna Manor's earlier flea markets, donated time and expertise pricing jewelry, high value and vintage items. It was good to work with them again.

The day before the flea market many volunteers helped us move items to the 40' x 100' brilliant white tent (*see cover middle*). A box truck (*see picture top of next page*), donated by **Bob** and **Bonnie Kirkwood**, was particularly useful that day. Our volunteers who lifted, carried, and arranged were: Srs. Christa Kreinbrink, Aileen Bankemper, Colleen Winston, Cathy, Mariana, Mary Tewes, Deborah, Mary Catherine and Denise Vocke,

Dec. 8, 2013—On this feast of the Immaculate Conception Sr. Mary Catherine announced that Sr. Carmella Azzolina had died while the community was at Eucharist. (See p. 18) She died as Father Cahill was delivering his homily on hope and repentance.

Dec. 18—Fifth grade VMA students and their teachers made a Christmas visit this morning. They sang carols with amazing on-key voices, served homemade cookies and gave a wash cloth and personal cards to each sister.

Dec. 20--The annual St. Walburg Monastery Employee Christmas party was held today. The highlights of the party were the food, presents and playing with hula hoops. Not only did the young women working in the kitchen and infirmary lead partygoers in hula hooping, but they devised a game of throwing hula hoops over one another and their supervisors.

Dec. 24—In the chapel a natural fir tree glowed with a stable, figures and empty crib at its base. At Evening Prayer there was a blessing of the crib. The traditional Christmas party with its songs and gifts concluded this Christmas Eve. **Dec. 25**—A light snow greeted the morning sun as our Christmas Day began. After Eucharist the community and guests enjoyed the traditional brunch. Dec. 31—After a long struggle, Sr. Immaculata Haar died this morning, the last day of the old year. (See page 18.) Jan. 6-7—The whole country suffered heavy snow and zero weather or other inclemencies. We experienced temperatures as low as 9 below zero. It was the coldest spell in years, but two days later temps were in the 30's and 40's. Results: much sneezing and coughing.

Jan. 10-13—Sr. Mary Catherine, accompanied by Sr. Andrea Collopy, left early this morning for a meeting at St. Marys, Pennsylvania. After a busy Saturday, they left Sunday morning for Fairfax, Virginia for the funeral service of Louise Porter, Sr. Kimberly

Porter's mother, who died suddenly of a massive heart attack. Also at the service were Srs. Aileen Bankemper, Cathy Bauer, Christa Kreinbrink and Betty Cahill who drove from Kentucky on Saturday.

Jan. 18—At Evening Prayer the community welcomed Patty Bickett (See p. 6) as a resident discerning membership in the community. Patty is from northern Indiana and had visited several times over the past months.

Jan. 24—Mary McFarland, an employee with the Benedictine Sisters at VMA and the monastery infirmary since 1976, retired at the end of January. A farewell luncheon with sisters and employees was followed in the afternoon with a social featuring a presentation of "memories during the years." (See p. 5.) Jan. 30—Sr. Mary Catherine and Sr. Rita Brink, who is serving as administrator at St. Joseph Monastery, St. Marys, Pennsylvania, left for Atchison, Kansas to attend the Conference of Prioresses. The meeting will conclude on Feb. 5. The meeting included a retreat presented by Sr. Irene Nowell, a Benedictine Scripture scholar from the Atchison community.

January was a month of unusually severe weather with spurts of snow and zero temps. Weather forecasters were notably accurate and this was a benefit in preparing the next day's car trips. The last two weeks of January saw freezing weather, and the Emergency Shelter of Northern Kentucky, giving shelter to a record-breaking number of people, needed volunteers to staff additional shelters. Srs. Cathy Bauer, Joan Fraenzle, Mariana Kirk and our kitchen manager Maureen Smain served at Mother of God Church, an additional emergency space. On Jan. 29th a total of 84 persons found food and shelter there on one of the coldest nights in recent history. Sr. Dorothy Schuette assisted in organization.

February has continued with frigid temperatures. A whole week of ice made driving and walking hazardous.

Feb. 14—VMA fifth graders and the

children from Villa Madonna Montessori School came for a visit and brought homemade valentines for each sister. Feb. 19-21—Much warmer temperatures with a quick melt down of ice and snow. We pray for no flooding. Feb.21—Srs. Mary Catherine, Mary Rabe and Mary Tewes left this morning for St. Marys, Pennsylvania, where they will attend a ceremony honoring the Benedictine Sisters of St. Joseph Monastery by the local religious and civic community. The founders of St. Joseph Monastery were the first Benedictine Sisters to come to the U.S. The community served that area of Pennsylvania for 162 years with service and sacrifice. St. Walburg Monastery is descended from St. Joseph Monastery through Mt. St. Benedict, Erie, Pennsylvania. Sisters from monasteries in Bristow, Virginia, Ridgley, Maryland, Erie and Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and Colorado Springs, Colorado, were present as were monks from Latrobe, Pennsylvania. St. Joseph Monastery is closing; its members are transferring elsewhere.

Mar. 1—VillaRama, the annual VMA fundraiser was held in the Academy multi-purpose building with a number of sisters serving in various capacities. Mar. 6-12—The first days of Lent found community members involved in all kinds of activities. Holy Week. During the day busy fingers shaped new palm into intricate designs; last year's palm and palm creations were collected for burning into ashes for next year's Ash Wednesday. During the afternoon Villa Madonna Montessori students performed Indian dances in the lower level for an appreciative audience. **Apr. 14**—The VMA fifth graders returned to the monastery for an iPad demonstration and a pre-Easter visit. Their bright green shirts signaled spring but the next day we awakened to a bright blanket of winter snow, a beautiful but rude awakening after days of 70degree temperatures.

Apr. 17-20—Lent ended with the solemn celebration of the Triduum. Fr. John Cahill was presider at the Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter liturgies. Fr. Frank Voellmecke was the presider for the Easter Vigil. Both priests are great blessings to us. Oblates, relatives and friends joined the community for Eucharist on Easter Sunday and the traditional Easter brunch.

Apr. 23—Members of the community attended the funeral services for Sophia Cahill, 98 year old mother of our chaplain, Fr. John Cahill. Mrs. Cahill was a very active Catholic in Eastern Kentucky where there were few Catholics. In her later years she came to the Northern Kentucky area to be nearer to her children.

Apr. 25—Sr. Mary Catherine left for St. Walburga Monastery in Elizabeth, New Jersey, to facilitate their preparation for the May election of prioress.

May 2—Most Rev. Roger Foys visited Villa Madonna Academy and blessed the Our Lady of the Rosary quilt, a creation of the total K-6 student body. The quilt will hang permanently in the second floor hall.

May 3—The day was a busy day of meetings and ended with what is always a celebration in Kentucky—the Kentucky Derby. We joined the TV crowd in singing *My Old Kentucky Home* before we watched the 140th run for the roses.

May 5, 12, 19--Sr. Deborah Harmeling gave a series of presentations entitled *Continued on next page*

Exploring the Illuminations of St. Hildegard of Bingen at St. Monica-St. George Newman Center in Cincinnati. She will reprise the presentation at the September 13 Center of Spirituality Day of Reflection.

May 15-16—On the 15th Srs. Dorothy Schuette, Mary Rabe and Joan Fraenzle attended the 19th performance of Shakespeare Behind Bars at Luther Luckett Correctional Complex in LaGrange, Kentucky. On the 16th Srs. Mary Tewes, Mary Carol Hellmann and Andrea Collopy made the trip for another performance. The cast of male prisoners assumed all the roles in Much Ado About Nothing. It was a wonderful performance by a group of impressive men. At the intermission and conclusion the men responded to questions and remarks by the audience. May 21-22—Srs. Dorothy Schuette, Mary Carol Hellmann and Mary Rabe, accompanied by Lorita Wadsworth, a nurse in our infirmary, and several others, made a two day trip to Eddyville, Kentucky, to celebrate Eucharist and visit with prisoners on death row. Last year the yearly visit was cancelled by traffic problems. This year the visitors made a two day trip—one day for travel and one day for visiting and travel.

May 21--Sr. Mary Catherine left this morning for China. She will spend two weeks in Beijing working with a community of religious women.

May 22—Sr. Immaculata Campbell died early this morning. (See pgs. 18-19.) A serious stroke eight years ago ended an active ministry but not community participation.

June 2—The Pike Street Clinic for the Homeless celebrated its 25th year of service to the poor of the Covington area. Sr. Ann John Kotch received an achievement award for her constant and loving service during those 25 years. The celebration occurred on the corner of 343 Pike Street with music, refreshments and good conversation.

June 3—Today we celebrated Founders' Day. On June 3, 1859 three Benedictine sisters from Erie, Pennsylvania, arrived in Covington, Kentucky, at the invitation of **Bishop George Carrell**. Each year at Morning Prayer we read a translation from the German annals about the early days.

With thankful prayer we also welcomed **Sr. Mary Catherine** back from her trip to China.

June 6—The 3rd annual picnic for women religious sponsored by Bishop Roger Foys and the Serra Club was held at the Ryland Lakes Country Club. (See this page.) It was a beautiful and relaxing day, with great food, outdoor and indoor activities, games, visits with good friends and the gracious services of so many "red shirted" Serrans, volunteers, diocesan staff and clergy. June 7—At Evening Prayer I of Pentecost, Sr. Mary Catherine Wenstrup was installed as prioress to continue her service to God and community. Fr. John Cahill gave the homily and oblates and other friends were present. Maureen Smain and her kitchen crew re-arranged the dining room and prepared creative Italian, Mexican, Chinese and American food stations. June 14—St. Walburg Monastery, Madonna Manor, Villa Madonna Academy and Villa Madonna Montessori collaborated on the *Nifty Fifty Festival and Flea Market* celebrating the 50th anniversary of Madonna Manor. (*See pgs. 3-4.*) A beautiful cool day with abundant bargains and delicious bakery items drew a large crowd to the tent at Madonna Manor and the Villa Madonna gym.

Running the Race with St. Benedict

The first Saturday of May is always a community day for the Benedictine Sisters of St. Walburg Monastery. Not only is it our annual corporation meeting, but it is also the running of the Kentucky Derby. This year **Sr. Betty Cahill**, the community archivist, presented a reflection comparing the running of the derby with some admonitions from St. Benedict in his rule.

Today is the 140th running of the Kentucky Derby. Nowhere does St. Benedict mention the Derby in the Benedictine Rule.

Of course not! He wrote his Rule many centuries before the first running of the Kentucky Derby.

But on second thought, he did have some sense of an important race taking place. He may not have had the "The Run for the Roses" in mind, but he surely wrote plenty about running a race and crossing the finish line.

Right in the very beginning of the Rule, in the Prologue, he has his monks at the starting gate biting at the bit.

He instructs them:

run -- while you have the light of life;

run -- by doing good deeds;

run -- and do now what will profit you forever;

run -- with your hearts overflowing with

the inexpressible delight of love.

Then he enlightens them on some of the tricks of the trade:

how to be aware of others in the race

how to set the pace

how to avoid trouble spots

how to stay focused

how to stay in the race

Benedict doesn't seem to care about who crosses the finish line first. He just wants everyone to give his/her very best.

The only competition he really supports is found in Chapter 72 of the Rule:

Earnestly competing in obedience to one another

they should each try to be the first to show respect to the other.


Benedict awards no blanket of roses or claim to fame at the end of the race. But he does promise that those who cross the finish line will know the inexpressible delight of love and will receive everlasting life.





Sister Carmella Azzolina

was born to **Salvadore** and **Carmella (Leone) Azzolina** in Welch, WV on May 13, 1909 and given the name Mary Virginia. Immigrants from Sicily, her parents had five daughters of whom Mary was oldest. In 1923 their mother died at the age of 36. A desperate father received help from a priest friend who directed him to Villa Madonna Academy, a Kentucky boarding school. The academy could provide care only for the four older children so the youngest was placed in the care of an aunt. Eventually Mr. Azzolina moved to Florida. Mary graduated in 1926, and the girls moved to Florida to be with their father.





Sr. Carmella received a BA from Villa Madonna College, majoring in French and Spanish. She earned her MA from Catholic University, and continued her education with summer classes at Kalamazoo College, Laval University, Quebec, and Xavier University. As a foreign language teacher, she was dearly loved at both Villa Madonna Academy where she taught for 22 years and at Holy Cross High for 27 years. Before retiring she served in Holy Cross High School library and study halls. Srs. Carmella and Samuel were a strong presence in the school and parish community until their retirement to the monastery in 2006.

The ties that existed in the Azzolina family drew relatives from far and wide to St. Walburg Monastery regularly, and the two sisters to Florida and Washington. Sr. Samuel's death in January, 2013 was difficult for Sr. Carmella.

Shortly before Thanksgiving Sr. Carmella fell and was admitted to the hospital. She returned to the infirmary under hospice care. She died peacefully on December 8, 2013 at the age of 104. She was the longest lived member of St. Walburg Monastery.

Sister Immaculata Haar

was born to Joseph W. and Catherine (Miller) Haar on October 24, 1924 in New Orleans, LA and was given the name Rose



Elizabeth at her baptism. Rose was the second youngest of nine siblings, all of whom are deceased. The oldest girl, Bernadette, had become **Sister Bernardine** at St. Scholastica Priory in Covington, LA. Rose entered St. Scholastica's on August 26, 1939. The following year she became a novice with a new name, **Sr. Immaculata**. She made first and perpetual professions in 1942 and 1945. Both Sr. Immaculata and Sr. Bernardine transferred to St. Walburg Monastery upon the dissolution of St. Scholastica Priory in 1988.

Sr. Immaculata's education extended over a number of years. She attended Loyola University in New Orleans and Dominican College and Holy Cross in Algiers, LA and earned her degree in music and certification in elementary education. Sr. Immaculata served in many capacities in the New Orleans area—as elementary teacher and principal, librarian, music teacher and organist for 40 years despite a growing hearing loss. From 1978-1988 Sr. Immaculata worked as a bookkeeper in a Covington, LA law firm. When she transferred to St. Walburg Monastery in 1988, she used these skills in the business office at Madonna Manor where she aided the business manager until her retirement in 2008.

When Sr. Immaculata moved to Kentucky she brought with her the devotion of many friends, evidenced by the letters and mementos in her mail bin. Nieces, nephews and friends were welcome visitors. Sr. Immaculata was delighted when shrimp, praelines or a Mardi Gras king cake appeared at the table.

Sr. Immaculata moved to the infirmary because of weakness and a blood condition. Her blood condition required more frequent medical attention but visitors were always greeted with a welcoming smile. She died peacefully on December 31, 2013.

Sister Immaculata Campbell

was born in Ft. Mitchell, KY on January 30, 1923 to **James Henry** and **Eleanor Griffith Campbell** and given the name Eleanor at her baptism. She and her twin Patricia were the middle children with an older sister Mary and a younger brother Jim. These siblings preceded her in death. Educated by Benedictine Sisters at Blessed Sacrament and Holy Cross Schools, Eleanor entered St. Walburg Monastery on August 15, 1941 and became a novice as **Sister Immaculata** on June 29, 1942. She made her first monastic profession on June 30, 1943 and perpetual profession three years later.

With her B.A. degree from Villa Madonna College, Sr. Immaculata was prepared for classroom teaching and she exercised her skills in many diocesan schools and in Colorado. She earned an M.A. degree at Xavier University after several summers. Sr. Immaculata taught in both elementary and secondary schools 1946 to 1970. She was a Diocesan Supervisor from 1958 to 1961. Summers from 1958 to 1962 took her to Catholic University where she earned an M.S. in Library Science. She served as librarian at Thomas More College, at a library in Bradenton, FL and at Bethesda Hospital, cataloging special collections. She completed training in clinical pastoral ministry in 1977.

From 1977 until 2006 Sr. Immaculata worked as a pastoral minister, particularly at St. Paul Parish in Florence. This work took her into Woodspoint and Florence Park Care Centers where she ministered to the elderly and formed strong bonds of friendship.

On September 19, 2006 Sr. Immaculata suffered a severe stroke which left her unable to continue active ministry. She participated as best she could in common prayer, activities and recreation. She enjoyed cards and other games with the sisters. Her physical condition continued to decline and she died in the early hours of May 23, 2014.




Helen Kiffmeyer, Charming Woman, Gifted Educator & Benedictine Oblate

When the Benedictine Associate Program accepted members in 1987, Helen became one of the first members. She was present at the 20th anniversary celebration of the group where the title was changed to Oblates, still full of life and laughter.

Pat Heidrich, who celebrated her 81st birthday in January, was not able to do many of the things she loved to do because of knee pain for much too long. She finally found a doctor she trusted and prepared for her knee replacement surgery



on April 8th, eager to go to Madonna Manor for rehab. Confident and peaceful, she had the surgery and got to Madonna Manor for rehab on April 12th. Complications from reactions to some meds set her on her final journey, when she was taken back to the hospital on Holy Thursday – entering the Paschal Mystery with Jesus, and dying on April 30th.

Pat was one of the original group of Associates in 1987. We all knew of her devotion to her husband, **Art**, her 4 children, **Donna**, **Denise**, **Kris** and **Tim**, and her "greatest joy- my 5 grandkids." She was a member of St. Henry Parish, involved in several ministries, following a Cursillo life-changing experience in 1982. She participated in the Lay Ministry Development Program in the Diocese of Covington, where she learned how to prepare others to assume leadership roles in her parish.

Pat participated in the Associate (now Oblate) gatherings regularly, until her other commitments and pain kept her away. But she was there for the Oblation Renewal Days and the Ice-Cream Socials for sure. For the last 15 years Pat has served as Treasurer for the Benedictine Oblates.
