



July 23—At dinner this evening

A group of 13 from St. Walburg travelled to Morehead to join the celebration with Sr. Rosemary and to share in the potluck supper sponsored and attended by many parishioners. August 3-8—Fr. Joel Rippinger, **OSB**, a member of Marmion Abbey in Aurora, Illinois, conducted the annual community retreat. With "Revisiting the Benedictine Way" as his theme, Fr. Joel led us through five holy and peaceful days of reflection on our monastic profession and the Benedictine way of life. our guest this evening. She will join **Sr. Mary Catherine Wenstrup,** our prioress and **Sr. Rita Brink**, administrator of St. Joseph Monastery, St. Marys, Pennsylvania, journeying to the Conference of Prioresses and the LCWR meetings in Nashville, Tennessee.

August 16-17—The statue of Mary purchased with donations from Civil War soldiers was on display at the James A. Ramlage Civil War Museum during the annual Battery Hooper Days this weekend. Battery Hooper was an artillery fortification which contributed to the defense of Northern Kentucky during the Civil War. The museum holds artifacts of all kinds from the Civil War period, and this year the statue of Mary with its history held a prominent place in the museum. (See this page.) The weekend offered a great visit to the past—an 1860 fashion show, beginnings of St. Elizabeth Hospital, a special debate by vice presidential candidates and a fictional debate between President Lincoln and Confederate President Jefferson Davis. The sisters who attended found it a fascinating experience.

August 18-21—Sisters Mary Catherine Wenstrup, Deborah Harmeling, Cathy Bauer and resident Patty Bickett left for St. Marys, Pennsylvania where they rented a truck to "transplant" to St. Walburg Monastery dining room tables purchased from St. Joseph Monastery. Sr. Rita Brink, administrator, is supervising the sale of the remaining property of this historic monastery, the first monastery of Benedictine women in the United States. The Kentucky group returned on August 21 with Patty as driver of the U-Haul containing our grandmother's tables, smaller in size, giving our dining room a new look. In monastic tradition St. Joseph

Historic Statue of Mary Displayed at 2014 Battery Hooper Days

From the early days of our history we have treasured a Civil



War story and a statue of Mary. (see left) In the 1860's Mother Alexia Lechner was building a new monastery on Twelfth Street in Covington even though the country was in the midst of the Civil war. Union soldiers encamped near that location offered to help with the brickwork for the new building. One of the soldiers got mortar in his eyes and was in danger of losing his sight, but the Sisters prayed for a miracle and used a relic of St. Walburg to ask for her intercession.

The man's eyes were healed. To show their gratitude, the soldiers made a financial donation so that a statue of the Blessed Mother could be purchased for the new



chapel.

September 1—Edward Smain, father of our kitchen manager, Maureen Smain, died today. Members of the Smain family have served this community in countless ways. With other good friends, Benedictines attended the visitation on September 4, Ed's 84th birthday, and the funeral Mass on September 5. A reception for the Smains' many friends and guests was held in the monastery lower level in the afternoon.

September 2—Villa Madonna Academy, with its students, faculty, parents and friends, commemorated 110 years of Catholic education with a Mass celebrated by Fr. Baiju Kidaagen, chaplain. Although classes resumed for students, guests enjoyed a reception afterwards.

September 4—Sr. Cathy Bauer began a two year Spiritual Director Internship program at Benedict Inn Retreat and Conference Center, Our Lady of Grace Monastery, Beech Grove, Indiana. The program is designed for a person who desires to enrich his/her spiritual life, to discern whether they have a call to become a spiritual director, and to develop experientially the skills needed for spiritual direction. Sr. Cathy's visits to Beech Grove during the next two years will involve a varied but regular travel schedule.

September 28-29—Sr. Mary Tewes and Oblate Gail Michalack attended the Mid-West Regional meeting for Oblate Directors at Benedict Inn, Beech Grove, Indiana. Directors from monasteries in Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois and Michigan gathered. A committee was formed to organize a workshop for the region in 2016 to assist communities in forming lay Oblate Directors.

Patty Bickett attended the first in a series of two day classes offered by the Diocese of Covington's Office of Catechesis and Formation. As part of her program for her postulant year she will attend classes on Christology, the Old and New Testaments, Mariology, Eschatology and the Book of Psalms.

October 19—St. Walburg Monastery Oblates renewed their oblation today at community Noon Day Prayer. After celebrating Morning Prayer and Eucharist with the community, they assembled in the lower level for a group reflection led by Sr. Mary Tewes, oblate director. Sister Betty Cahill, 1931-2014

Born July 11, 1931 in Erlanger, Kentucky Entered St. Walburg Monastery for the third time, December 8, 1957

> Received habit, June 14, 1958 First Profession, August 24, 1959 Died October 23, 2014

Sister Betty Cahill was born to James C. and Georgia Hummel Cahill in Erlanger, KY on July 11, 1931, the feast of St. Benedict. She was given the name Betty Ann at her baptism. Betty was the fourth



of six children—four girls and two boys. Each sibling was known by a nickname. The Cahill family resided in Erlanger, home of St. Henry Parish where Betty was educated for twelve years by the Benedictine Sisters.

After entering St. Walburg Monastery twice before, Betty re-entered on December 8, 1957 and became a novice, Sister Kent, on June 14, 1958. First and perpetual profession followed in 1959 and 1962. When sisters were given the option to return to baptismal names, she became Sister Betty.

Sr. Betty was a lover of the great outdoors. During her first years at the monastery, she helped on the farm and studied at Villa Madonna College. By the time she received her BS in 1974 the college had moved and been renamed Thomas More College. Sr. Betty taught 3rd, 6th, 7th and 8th grades from 1961-1975 in diocesan schools, twice serving as principal and house superior. From 1978-1986 she spent happy years serving the people of Appalachia in Floyd County, Kentucky.

In 1987 Sr. Betty became part of the formation team at the monastery and continued as novice director until August, 2004. She worked hard to keep the grounds in tiptop shape and took an active interest in the natural environment for the rest of her life. Sr. Betty served as archivist in her later years, organizing, sifting, sharing. Her anecdotes from the archives were a featured event at each community meeting. In the last *LEAVEN* issue is a reflection by Sr. Betty on the running of the Kentucky Derby with admonitions from St. Benedict's Rule.

Sr. Betty's physical condition deteriorated in the last several months. Not one to complain, she made several trips to the hospital and frequent doctor trips. Having moved to the infirmary several weeks earlier, Betty made the choice for hospice care which was needed for only one day. She died peacefully on Thursday, October 23, 2014. Surviving Sr. Betty are her sisters Birdie, Ritzie and Dolly, and her brother Bill, her sister-in-law Ginny, many nieces and nephews and the Benedictine community.

Sister Dominic Sullivan, 1928-2014

Born January 14, 1928 in Ludlow, Kentucky Entered St. Walburg Monastery December 27, 1947 Received habit, June 29, 1948 First Profession, June 30 1949 Died November 11, 2014

Sister Dominic Sullivan, was born to James Patrick and Frances Breuer Sullivan on January 14, 1928 and given the name Mary when she was baptized at St. James Church, Ludlow, KY. Mary was the sixth of twelve children—six boys and six girls—two of

whom died in infancy. St. James School was staffed by the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth. Two of Mary's sisters entered that community, Sister Teresa Catherine and Sister Rose Patrick. One day in conversation with her sister Jean (Sister Rose), Mary declared she was planning to join the sisters "up on the hill". She became a postulant at St. Walburg Monastery on December 27, 1947 and began her novice year in 1948, receiving the name Sister Dominic. First and perpetual profession followed in 1949 and 1952. Silver, golden and diamond



jubilees were celebrated in 1974, 1999 and 2009.

After perpetual profession Sr. Dominic served as a nurse aide in hospitals staffed by the Benedictine Sisters in Florence and LaJunta, CO from 1949 until 1953. She returned to Kentucky where she taught primary or middle grades in the schools of the Covington diocese—Holy Cross, St. Therese, St. Paul and St. Francis Xavier.

In 1964 Sr. Dominic was sent to the Kentucky mountain region of Appalachia where she did catechetical work and home visiting for Our Lady of Good Counsel parish in Hazard, KY. These many years in the mountains were very active and happy ones for Sr. Dominic.

In 1980 when she returned to live at the monastery Sr. Dominic was engaged in home visiting and community service wherever she was needed, particularly in driving and helping in the infirmary. Failing health required that she move to the infirmary in 2004. Her family, far and near, visited frequently and in these last days were a constant presence in prayer and comfort. Sr. Dominic died peacefully in the evening of November 11. Her siblings, James, John, Ann, Thomas, Sr. Teresa Catherine, Elizabeth, Michael, Daniel and Theresa preceded her in death. Surviving her are her brother Joe and his wife Maureen, her sister Sr. Rose, SCN, many devoted nieces and nephews and this Benedictine community

Sr. Mary Catherine began facilitation of the discernment process for the election of prioress. Sr. Deborah helped a writing committee write direction statements and met the community in preparation for doing a day of reflection in March.

November 11—After a long illness and patient acceptance, Sr. Dominic Sullivan died today. (See obituary on this page.) Members of her family were frequent visitors during her years in the infirmary and were with her during these last days.

November 14-16--Srs. Dorothy Schuette and Mary Tewes led a retreat for women, *Encountering Christ in the Psalms* at the Guest House this weekend. Five women attended and issued great reviews. November 26--This evening we celebrated our traditional Thanksgiving community dinner with a 52 lb turkey (*See page 11.*) and many wonderful side dishes, homemade bread and homemade pies--pumpkin, apple and pecan.

Giving Thanks for Our Benedictine Heritage




