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Benedict instructs his followers that "First of all, every time we begin a new work, we must pray most earnestly that God will bring it to perfection." Prologue to the Rule of Benedict, v.4. Though the community has always engaged in meetings, the "meetings work" we are presently engaged in involves future planning. Collaboration, connection, communication are three dynamic words that influence our work. They are words used frequently by religious communities involved in looking to their future.

During the summer of 2019 we completed the sale of land to the west of the monastery property. The new development called Sanctuary Village is a thriving neighborhood. The sale was followed by community meetings in which we discussed "right-sizing" the monastery building. The building has outgrown us! However, these plans were short-lived as COVID struck and our "best laid plans" were put on hold. Since then conversations have resumed. Sister Rita's article in this issue of *Leaven* discusses what the *Visioning Our Future* committee planned for our recent three-day June session.



In the meantime, on our local diocesan level, the five religious community leaders and the Vicar for Religious regularly gather among themselves and quarterly with Bishop Iffert. We are dedicated to supporting one another's communities and searching out ways to be of help and assistance.

Last April, the Benedictine prioresses from Beech Grove and Ferdinand, IN and I began visiting with each other's councils. On August 26, nineteen council members from both communities will gather at St. Walburg's and meet with our council. Again, we will explore ways to collaborate, connect, and regularly communicate with one another. Later in the evening there will be an informal opportunity to gather with the rest of our community. We do know that we have the space to house all our guests!

"For surely, I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." Jeremiah 29:11. As we continue in hope to develop our plans for our future, know that we count on your continued support as we daily remember you in our prayers.

# **SISTERS DENISE AND STELLA GOUGH**

The family of Francis and Catherine Gough far from the home of the Benedictine grew up in downtown Covington, KY, not

Sisters and that of the bishop of the

Covington diocese and his offices at the cathedral. Neither of these two institutions knew that the family growing nearby would send three of their thirteen children to bring significant contributions to the church and the city.

Margaret Mary became the first to join the Benedictine

Sisters, but she was followed by two of her sisters, Denise and Stella Marie. Margaret Mary would eventually work for the diocesan bishop in the planning office and Stella would serve as head of the religious education department. Denise would serve hospitals both in and

outside the diocese.


Frank and Catherine started their family on Robbins then later moved to Byrd, Scott, and Trevor Streets in Covington, at times living above and behind their grocery store. Most of the time it was close quarters for the growing family, and the children got accustomed to one room for boys, one for girls, and one for mother and dad. Stella, the 2nd youngest, has vivid memories of having lots of people around. She also has Saturday memories of a big pot of chili on the stove and a table with leaves to make room for the entire family. Denise remembers Margaret Mary as a teen preparing Sunday dinners and Mary Ellen, the oldest daughter, being her mother's sidekick to help with children and chores. In fact, she was so important to their mother that she didn't get to go to high school, even to learn secretarial skills at St. Benedict Commercial as did Margaret Mary, Denise, and Stella.

When I asked Srs. Denise and Stella whom they considered a primary influence to entering St. Walburg, they both cited their sister Maggie who entered in 1950. Denise also named Fr. Ed Bauman who was spiritual director for the sodality to which she belonged. He took the group to visit the Sisters of Divine Providence and Charity of Nazareth. Five of the sodality girls entered the CDP's, but she chose the Benedictines where Maggie had already entered. Even before Stella considered religious life, during childhood she had years of experience of visiting St. Walburg regularly

to see her sisters. She commented: "I swear Maggie and Denise prayed me in!" Because their graduation was from a commercial high school, all three sisters had to get additional credits before going on to advanced studies. They accomplished this with tutoring from sisters like Samuel and Carmella Azzolina and Maureen Ceboll. When this was completed, Maggie and Stella went on to Villa Madonna College. Denise volunteered for nursing school, largely due to the influence of her 1<sup>st</sup> cousin Florence Wolkering who served during the war as a nurse in the branch of service attached to the Women's Army Corps (WACS). Denise was sent to St. Elizabeth Hospital's School of Nursing in Covington. After graduation from St. E's, she served in the Benedictine community's mountain hospital in Hazard, KY. Then in 1965 she went to St. Cloud, MN, to become an anesthetist; the school was run by the Benedictine sisters of St. Joseph, MN. Denise thinks of that community with great fondness, especially how they helped her when her father died in 1966; they were very compassionate and helpful. She remembers in particular their help with packing and taking her to the airport.

Stella worked a year or two before entering St. Walburg. Once a member, she

was assigned to be an elementary teacher, and like many of the community's teachers, she got her college credits from Villa Madonna College by going in summers and on weekends, times she wasn't in the classroom. After graduation she got her MA at Xavier University and a theology certificate from the University of Notre Dame. While teaching at St. Henry and other schools she began working extensively with religious education for adults and with CCD for students who weren't able to get religion classes at the schools they were attending. This ministry paved the way for her being hired in time to be head of religious education for the diocese of Covington.

Since becoming part of the Benedictine community, their ministries have taken Srs. Stella and Denise on different paths around the state and beyond. Denise served in the community's mountain hospitals and those in Colorado, as well as in St. Clare Medical Center in Morehead, a facility run by the Covington Sisters of Notre Dame. Besides her education ministries around the diocese, Stella has had a number of ministries within the monastery house. Currently she is coordinator for health care scheduling and purchasing, and on the side, she is a cantor for liturgies. In the past she also wore the

hat of house and transportation coordinator.

When asked what her favorite period of ministry was, Stella said it was her time at St. Henry Parish when she was working alongside so many generous, capable, hardworking laypeople in CCD. Another favorite period was 25 years as a member of the Athenaeum chorale, organized as part of the Cincinnati Archdiocesan seminary. The enrichment that was hers through this experience in turn has enriched the music ministry of the St. Walburg community.

Denise said she liked everywhere she served, but Morehead had the added benefit of her being able to get back to the monastery more frequently than when she was in other places.

Born in the shadow of the Cathedral, despite all the ups and downs, gains and losses over the years, Stella and Denise remain faithful servants of the church. Always sisters in more ways than one, as the years pass they persevere in a ministry of care and prayer for each other, the community, and all who share their life in any way. Frank and Catherine, through Stella, Denise, Margaret Mary, and all their siblings, left a significant gift to this Northern KY community.



### in memoriam

# sr. andrea collopy



Sister Andrea Collopy was born on April 7, 1926 to Edward Charles Collopy and Marie Schawe Collopy and given the name

Ruth Cecilia. Ruth was the oldest of eight; three brothers and four sisters followed.



Ruth entered St. Walburg Monastery in 1944, became a novice in 1945, and received the name Andrea. First profession followed in 1946, perpetual in 1949, silver jubilee in 1971, golden in 1996, 60<sup>th</sup> in 2006, and diamond in 2021.

Sister Andrea taught for a year at St. Benedict's in Covington before moving in 1950 to Villa Madonna Academy, where she served for 40 years, including five as director of the boarding school. She completed her bachelor's degree in English and History at Villa Madonna College in 1950, and her MA in English at the University of Notre Dame in 1955.

Sr. Andrea taught English, History and Latin at VMA. To one Current Events student, Sr. Andrea seemed to have comprehensive knowledge of the entire world; it was daunting to take one of her exams. She invited students to meet her high standards with warmth and understanding. In 40 years of teaching Sr. Andrea taught generations of students who remember her with love and respect.

Sr. Andrea took on several roles within the Benedictine community: community secretary, procurator, house coordinator, infirmary coordinator, and subprioress. Sr. Mary Catherine Wenstrup comments: "She kept me [as prioress] from making many mistakes and foolish judgments."

Sr. Andrea's file gives 2003 as her "retirement", although her generous and hard work persisted. She was the first to sub for someone who needed it. She wrote thoughtful thank-you

notes to donors, conducted exercises for the sisters, kept up the Chronicles for *Leaven*, and crocheted endless baby booties while on phone duty: cowboy boots, inline skates, saddle shoes and work boots. Humble, honest, and gracious, she still worried that she might not be good enough for heaven.

After a few years of worsening memory, Sister Andrea died in the evening of April 3, 2023. She is preceded in death by her parents Edward C. and Marie Schawe Collopy, her brothers, James, Thomas and Edward, Jr. She is survived by her sisters Mary Wright, Rita Thaman, Ann Egbers, Claire Heringer, many nieces and nephews, and her Benedictine community.

Vigil service was held the evening of April 11, 2023 and the Mass of Christian Burial on April 12, 2023 followed by interment at St. Walburg Cemetery.



Sr. Lynn continued by saying in the future, there will be new forms of networking and collaboration with Benedictines, nationally, internationally, and intergenerationally in order to foster new ways of living monastic life.

The approximately fifty sisters in attendance then practiced collaboration skills by volunteering for one of two service projects. Sr. Eileen sorted and re-boxed clothes for the Orphan Train while Sr. Kimberly spent the afternoon at Mercy Meals packaging nutritious meals to help reverse malnutrition.

What is something you think needs to be addressed for the future of Benedictine life that can result in action? After brainstorming in groups, each sister submitted her choice for a project to work on with others. Coincidentally, Srs. Kimberly and Eileen both chose leadership as their topic. We will meet with our group via Zoom several times in the coming year. Then the 55 & under group will reconvene in Yankton, SD and present their projects to the congregation presidents.




# looking ahead . . .
